JACK BONE RESPITED

Governor Terrell has granted a respite to Jack Bone of Floyd Co. until January 13 1905, in order that time may be given for inquiry into the question as to weather or not he is insane.

Governor Terrell will appoint a commission of physicians under the act of 1903 to inquire into bones mental condition.

Bones crime was the murder of farmer Zach Hall of Floyd County. He was under the impression that Hall had caused him to be sent to the chaingang and threatened to kill him. He followed up this threat by going to Hall and shooting him down while the latter was working in the field.

The bride is one of our popular young ladies with traits of womanly character. The Groom , son of Peter Jackson of Black Rock, is a young farmer of sterling character and worth.

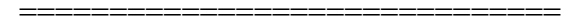

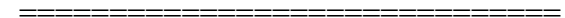
There are a few of the commemorative Courthouse Plates still available. These are available only at the History Center and are \$12.00 each.
