PRESIDENT IN THE WOODS

President Roosevelt is now separated from civilization. he is in camp with his comrades in the chase at Panther Springs, on the deep Red River, fourteen miles east of Frederick, Oklahoma. The largest crowd that ever thronged the streets of Fort Worth, welcomed President Roosevelt Saturday when he arrived from San Antonio, Texas. The Presidents special train reached Wichita at 2:45 Saturday afternoon. An immense crowd greeted him when the train stopped at the station.

Admiral receives token of esteem on his visit to Mobile, Ala.

At Mobile, Ala Thursday afternoon the members of the Raphael Semmes Camp United Confederate Veterans, clad in their uniforms of gray, and carrying a old battle flag, recently returned to them, called on Admiral and Mrs Schley, and paid their respects in behalf of the camp, O.J. Semmes, son of Admiral Semmes, presented the admiral with a magnificent thirty-second degree Mason jewel.

the spot where the last shot was fired in the war by N. Carolina troops.
